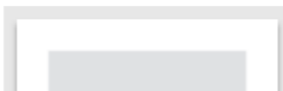



Leading to an AHRC proposal

The project takes a grounded approach to intervention at coastal sites, through partnership with The Crown Estate, which maintains a range of assets around the UK foreshore and seabed (TheCrownEstate, 2016).

Through partnership with the Estate and engagement with coastal communities, the project is delivered through 1) fieldwork, followed by 2) interventions and making, leading to 3) events and publications.

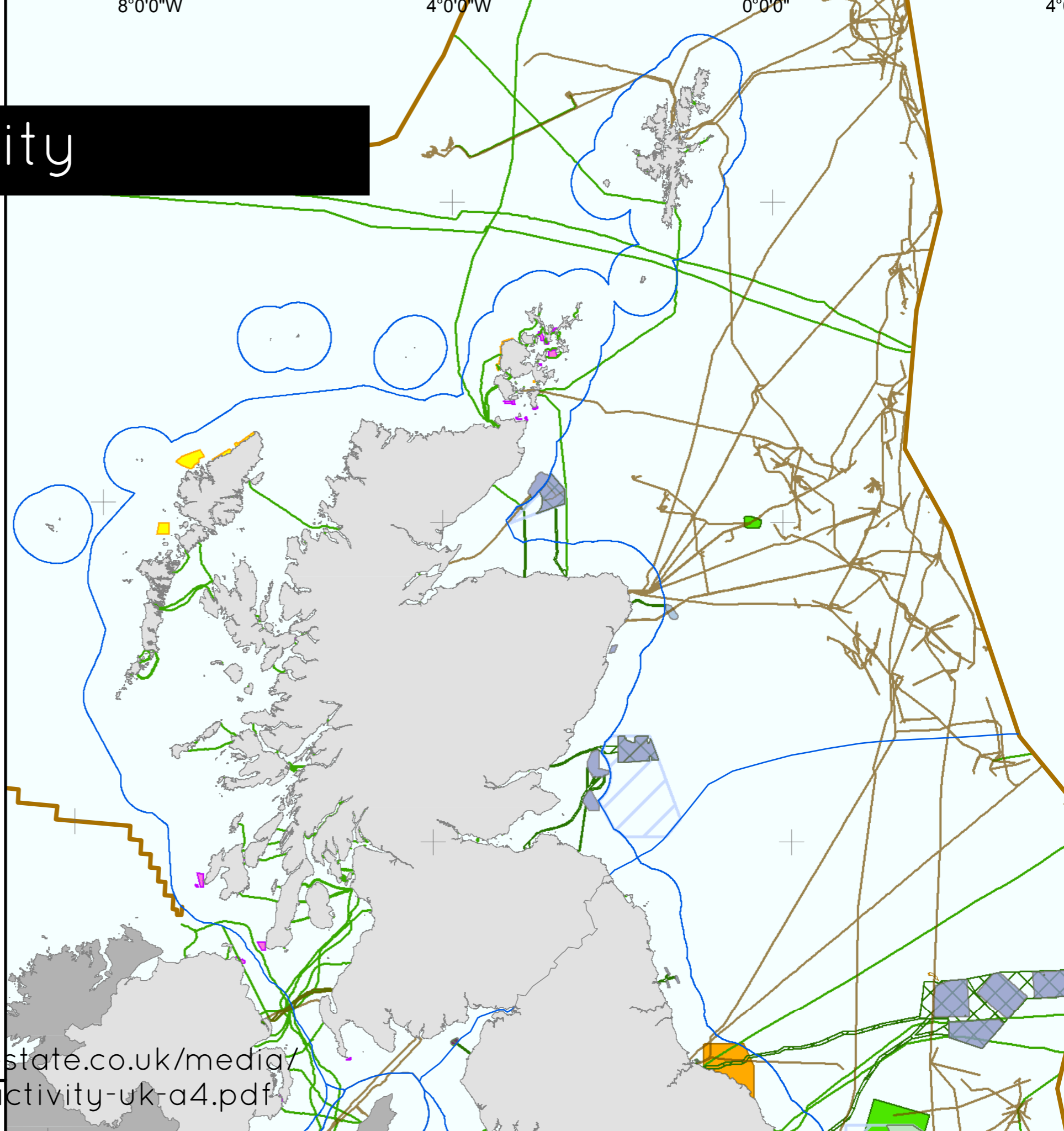

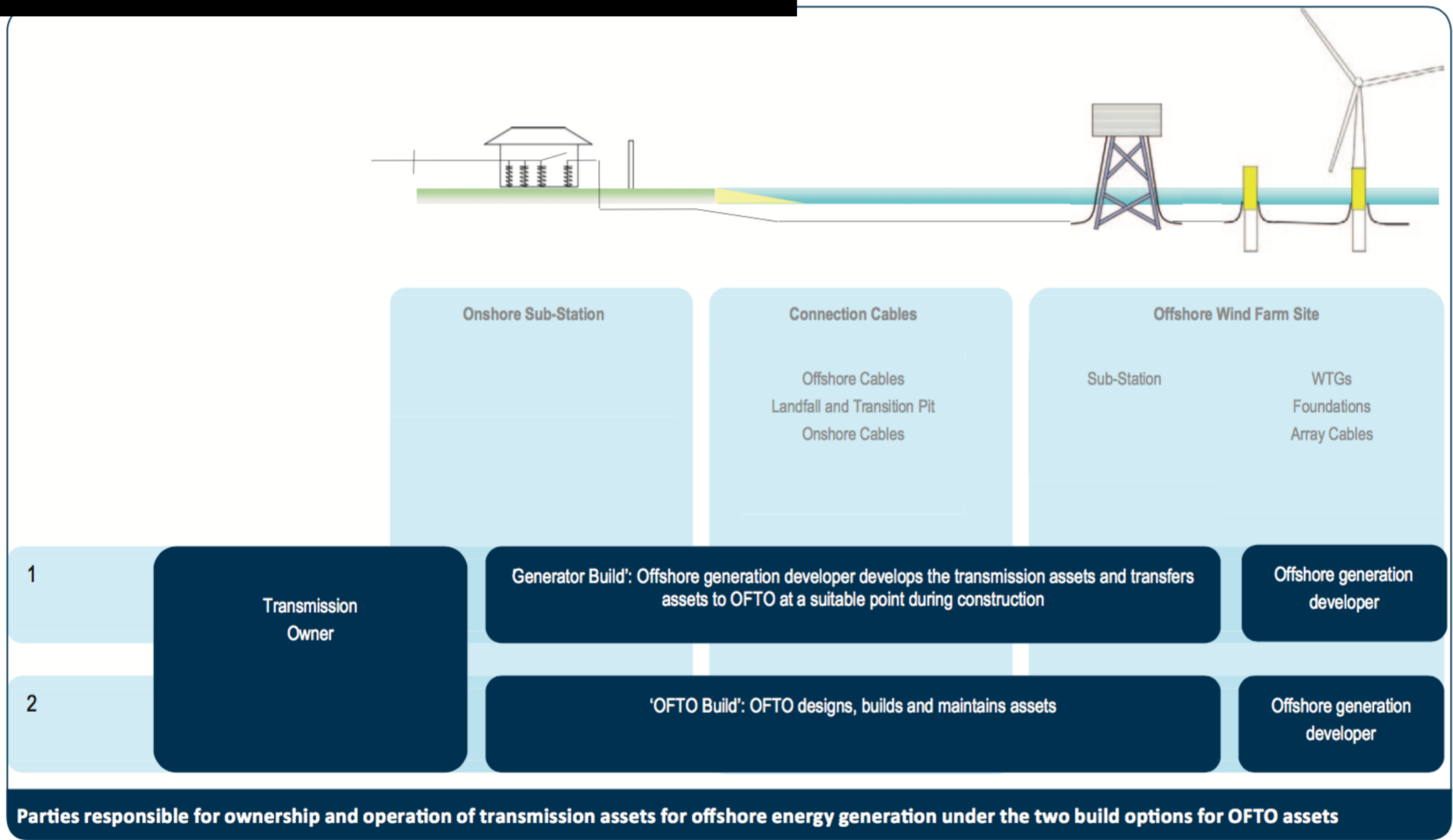

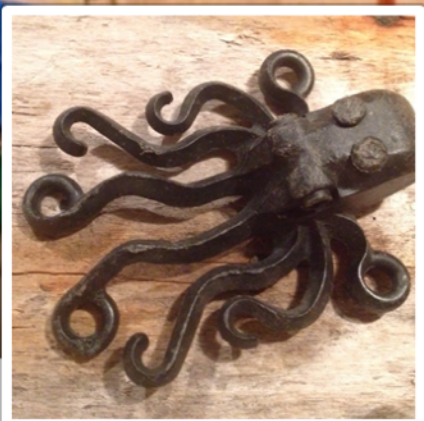
